Dear Student,

I have studied womanhood and femininity my whole life. Looking back, I can only say that today I stand more amazed than ever at the beauty and power of God's design for gender. Masculinity and femininity are not accidents of evolution, social conventions, or tools of political oppression. Masculinity and femininity are God's design. They are the foundation of human life and glory in this world, and they are a window on the glory of God beyond this world.

I hope you are excited about being a woman. You are unique; your path through life will be unlike any other. Yet, God has not left us without truth and pattern. While every woman is different, all women have basic created characteristics in common because God made us to be women.

This course is organized around five great pillar truths from Scripture which tell us what femininity is from God's viewpoint. We have named these aspects of femininity: Daughter of the King, Helper-Completer, Sacred Vessel of Life, Handmaiden of Wisdom, and Glory of Man.

Second, we study the ways in which sin breaks and perverts this part of femininity. Third, we see how Christ restores this aspect through His saving work. Me?!—A Model of God The best place to begin the search for our basic identity is at the very beginning, at the creation of man and woman. God is the only eye witness to this beginning, but, thankfully, He has given us a record of what happened. The book of Genesis is one of His greatest gifts to us because it tells us where we came from, who we are, and why we are here.
Let's step into Genesis, chapter 1, where day six of Creation is described. We find God explaining in simple phrases His design for man and woman. He talks about the image man and woman will reflect and the work they will do. Here are God's deep, soulsatisfying, and unchanging answers to our questions "Who am I?" and "Why am I here?"
3. From Genesis 1:26-27 (p. 1), what model did God use when He created man and woman?

4. Read the definition of "image" in the sidebar. Each replica below is a model of something else. What does each model replicate? (what is it an image of?) A doll in a wedding gown: Monet's painting of a lily pond: The Statue of Liberty (what does it visually represent?):

Has someone ever told you, "You're just like so-and-so!"? When someone said this, didn't it make you curious about that person? God says, "You are like Me; you're a little statue, an 'action figure' of Me." Doesn't that make you want to know more about God?! The best way to know more about ourselves is to know more about the God we reflect.

God—The Original Person

What does it mean to be in the image of God? The simple and most frequent answer given to this question is that we as human beings have a mind, a will, and emotions. That is, we think, we choose, and we feel. We relate as persons, not as machines or animals. In these ways we are like God Who thinks, chooses, and feels. He is a Person, not a machine or an animal.

The better we understand God's specific characteristics, the better we will understand our human characteristics. Some of God's divine characteristics (attributes) are listed below with simple definitions.

GOD IS:

Righteous: His character is the basis of all morality, law, and

He impartially punishes evil and rewards good. **Just:** Sovereign: God never loses control, His purposes are ful-

filled.

Love: God always does the best for His creatures. All knowing: God is omniscient; He knows everything.

All powerful: God is omnipotent; He is almighty.

Unchanging: God is immutable in character; He is always love,

just, etc.

Eternal: He is without beginning or end.

Important Terms

image: a reproduction; a tangible or visible representation. (Webster's)

image of God: humans are little statues, replicas, or models of God. Our human characteristics are patterned after His divine characteristics.

Important Term

attribute: an inherent characteristic; one basic to the nature of the one whose possesses it (e.g., Palomino horses have golden coats.)

I m p o r t a n t T e r m s divine attributes: the infinite characteristics which only God possesses such ultimate sovereignty, justice, love, knowledge, power, righteousness.

human attributes: the limited, but personal characteristics which are created in each human by God, such as:

conscience: built-in sense of justice, or of right and wrong

will: ability to make responsible decisions and choices

personality/heart: capacity for love, grief, wonder, etc.

mind: ability to know with capacity for memory, logic, imagination, creativity

power: capacity to change
our world

character stability: our character traits become more fixed as we mature

immortality: with a beginning but without end

Stop and look over the list of God's attributes. This is the amazing Person you are created to be like!

Studying a model or image of something helps us learn a lot about the actual thing, especially if the actual thing is unknown, majestic, or huge. If we were to study a museum model of the Grand Canyon, we could learn much about its shape, color, terrain, and proportions. But only when we stand at the edge of that one-mile-deep valley do we see its grandeur and awesomeness. In the same way, we are only small museum-quality models of God's limitless nature; yet, we accurately represent Him because we are made in His image.

God patterned our human spirits after His divine Spirit. This is the core of our imagehood. God modeled our human characteristics after His own infinite characteristics.

7. How does knowing that God made you a replica of Himself change the way you see yourself? What does this say about your value?
God's creation of us is evaluated by the Artist Himself as "very good." We were made to reflect the Creator of the Universe, to be like Him. This incredible truth is the answer to our first question, "Who am I?"
Born to Rule
The Bible's answer to our first big question of identity is that we are models of God, made in His divine image. But the original question "Who am I?" leads to another question: "Why am I here?"
8. What is the first purpose for man and woman as revealed by God in Genesis 1:28?
God's first command to man and woman was not to love God or fulfill the Great Commission. His first command was to do something—to rule the earth for Him. God could have stayed and ruled the earth Himself. Instead, He commissioned man and woman to be His representatives. This commission given by God in Genesis 1:28 is often called the World Mandate .
According to the dictionary a "mandate" is "a formal order from a superior officer to an subordinate one, an authorization to act as given to a representative."
Look again at Genesis 1:28. In the World Mandate, God gives the man and woman three basic commands that can be expressed as the three verbs rule, subdue, and be fruitful.

Important Terms

World Mandate: The commission God gave Adam and Eve to rule the world for Him in Genesis 1:28. The World Mandate has three parts—

to rule: To have authority over; to guide and make decisions regarding a matter's course and destiny

to subdue: To bring under control by conquest and to keep under control by diligent maintenance

to be fruitful: To create value by multiplying, filling, and expanding in every area of life 9. With the help of the definitions in the sidebar, draw a line from each verb on the left to the best example of it on the right.

By making us little models of Himself, God has equipped us to rule for Him. He makes big, sovereign decisions, and we can make little decisions because we have a will. He has a gigantic, unlimited mind, and we have limited minds that can think and understand, and so on with all our attributes.

10. The first human body was made directly from the earth. All of our bodies return to dust after death. Our spirits come from God and return to Him. How does our being a combination of earth and spirit help us rule the earth for God?

God created this amazing place, made us His representatives, and said: "Here. You rule it, subdue it, and make it fruitful." He gives us responsibility for our world. By creating us in His image, He has made us capable of making the choices and doing the work necessary to rule for Him.

There are over five billion people on earth today. Mankind has explored and mapped all the earth and has started on outer space. Vast knowledge about God's creation has been accummulated, and countless crafts, technologies, arts, and sciences have been refined to amazing levels. So we can see that a lot of ruling, subduing, and producing has already gone on. However, history is not over. You have been born into the world with God's image. You, too, are to rule, subdue, and be fruitful.

My World—My Realm—My Domain

We each have our own part of the world to rule. We will call that portion our **domain.**

Your domain is everything that God has given you responsibility for during your lifetime. It includes your relationship with God, the family God gave you, your friends, your time, your money, your body, your mind, your words, and the talents God has given you. All of these are valuable assets committed to you by God. He expects you to rule these for Him. This is the first basic answer the Bible gives to the question, "Why am I here?"

Knowing what you now know about God and His design for you, you have choices to make about how you will rule, subdue, and be fruitful. The choices start with your domain, your personal "garden." Your domain is unique to you—no one else can rule it; no one else is responsible for it but you.

As you complete this list, does it surprise you how much is in your domain? God has made you a ruler in His image with authority from Him to make decisions, to rule, subdue, and be fruitful. This includes everything from cleaning out your closet, to choosing your friends, to deciding Who will be your God or gods.
Because this is true, what should I do? One of the biggest areas young women need to rule is time management. Some girls try to do so many things, they stay exhausted and do nothing well.
13. Ruling time means choosing what you will and will not do. These are your priorities. What are your priorities right now—the things you have chosen to accomplish this semester or this year?
14. Subduing in the area of time means bringing it under control so that you match what you have to do with the time you have. This is called scheduling . Do you have a schedule? Does it match your priorities? In other words, do you set aside time to accomplish the goals you have chosen?



The question is ...

If God made humans and the world to be very good, what's wrong with everything now?

The answer is ...

Adam chose to rebel against God, so now everything is fallen and cursed.

The basic text is ...

Genesis 2:16-17

16 The LORD God commanded the man, saying, "From any tree of the garden you may eat freely; 17 but from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat from it you will surely die."

Genesis 3:17-19

17 Then to Adam He said, "Because you have listened to the voice of your wife, and have eaten from the tree about which I commanded you, saying, 'You shall not eat from it'; cursed is the ground because of you; in toil you will eat of it all the days of your life. 18 Both thorns and thistles it shall grow for you; and you will eat the plants of the field; 19 By the sweat of your face you will eat bread, till you return to the ground, because from it you were taken; for you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

In the "shattered" lesson of each aspect, we will explore from Scripture the nature of sinful femininity. If we can understand what our real problems are, then we will be better able to receive God's solutions.

ABOUT THE FALL & THE CURSE



Getting Started

1. Check everything that went wrong for you this week. I got sick. I forgot something important. Something I really needed broke (my computer, car, hair dryer, etc.) Someone let me down when I needed their help. I lost my temper and hurt my good friend. other What's wrong with this world anyway? Why is life so hard? You're not imagining it. "Life" (your world, your domain) is working against your best efforts to rule and be productive. What's happened to God's good design? A Catastrophe at the Beginning We have answered the question "Who am I?" by seeing that we are made in God's image. We have found out why we are here: to rule our worlds for God. But our everyday lives prove that something is wrong. At the beginning of time, man and woman rebelled against God the King. Because of that rebellion, all of humanity, this planet, and the whole universe have been changed ever since. God instructed Adam not to eat of the tree of knowledge (Gen. 2:16-17, p. 11). 2. What did Eve know about the tree of knowledge (Gen. 3:2-6, sidebar)? 3. From Genesis 3:4-5, what did the serpent say that wasn't true?

With every privilege there comes a responsibility. Adam and Eve's privilege was to live in the perfect garden in complete and open fellowship with God. They were to obey God by not eating

Genesis 3:2-6 2 The woman said to the serpent, "From the fruit of the trees of the garden we may eat; 3 but from the fruit of the tree which is in the middle of the garden, 4 God has said, "You shall not eat from it or touch it, or you will die.' " The serpent said to the woman, "You surely will not die! 5 For God knows that in the day you eat from it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." 6 When the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was desirable to make one wise, she took from its fruit and ate; and she gave also to her husband with her, and he ate.

of one tree in the garden. Adam and Eve had spoken with God personally. They knew God's command about the tree, and they even had each other there for moral support. Yet they still chose to disobey God's only restriction on their lives.

The Curse of Consequences

Thinking back to God's attributes from the last lesson, we know that God is righteous and just, and therefore must judge disobedience. God told Adam that if he ate of the tree, he would surely die. God keeps His word. His judgments upon the Serpent, Adam, and Eve for their disobedience are called the **Curse**.

My image of God is broken

Since the Fall, we still have the image of God, but now that image has been corrupted by sin. Now our consciences are hardened, our wills are in rebellion, our hearts are defiled, and our minds are in darkness. We are dominated by a sinful nature that is hostile to God and cannot know Him. We were created to be sons and daughters of God, but now in sin we are lost to God's Fatherhood. We are His creatures, but not His children. In the next lesson, *Daughter of the King Restored*, we will see what God has done to make us His daughters again.

5. How can you tell that the people around you are still in God's image, yet they are broken and corrupted?
The Fall and the Curse did not remove the divine image from us (Gen. 9:6). But we do see that our image, originally created to reflect God's image, has been distorted by sin. In addition, our relationships with one another and with God are also shattered by betrayal and disobedience. Into the gaping hole left by sin comes pain, shame, and guilt.
6. What does Romans 5:12 and Galatians 5:19-21 (sidebar) say about your spiritual life?
7. We cannot think, moralize, or emotionally feel our way back to God. Discuss the meaning of this statement. What are some ways we as fallen people try to look good—as if we are not broken? What are some ways people try to please God even though they can't?

My domain fights against me

Bad choices led to a shattered divine image, broken relationships, pain, and separation. Choosing to live apart from God brings consequences not only to our reflection of His image, but also to our domains. Because of sin, the world is cursed and my domain rebels against me.

8. Review the chart completed in Question 5. From the chart and Romans 8:20-21, what, besides man, has been affected by sin (page 14)?
Creation, under God's original design, grew toward life and health. Since the Fall and the Curse, creation decays, moving toward death and suffering. Things are constantly getting old, wearing down, and dying. Our personal domains are fallen, just like the rest of the earth. You know this because you experience it every day. Life is a struggle. The work of ruling, subduing, and being productive is HARD. Remember, work is not the curse. Frustrating, unproductive work is the curse.
9. In the last lesson, we focused on ruling your time. What are some of the "thorns and thistles" that wreck your priorities and schedule and keep you from being productive?
In the beginning Adam rebelled and went his own way. His world rebelled against him, and now our worlds rebel against us. Choices were made. But there are choices for each of us yet to make.
Bad Examples—Jezebel and Lot's Wife Consider the two approaches to life expressed by Willful Wanda and Passive Patsy in the sidebar. Maybe you know these women and the philosophies they live by. Maybe one of them is you.
10. Each viewpoint is extreme, but which sounds most like women today? Do either one of the these sound like you?

Willful Wanda: I'm in charge of my life. I know what I want, and I'm going to get it. I'm focused, strong, confident, and smart. I'll define success for myself and get it my own way. Reaching my goals, climbing that social ladder— I've got the personal power to do it. So what if they're afraid of me. What's wrong with intimidation? Take the ball and run, I say, and don't worry about who you run over. It's win, win, win...and I will.

Passive Patsy: What's the big deal? No one's going to make me do anything I don't want to do. Why get so uptight? It'll work out in the end. If I don't do it, someone else will. I always manage to slide right through. My laidback attitude is the way to live—sit back, relax, don't think too much. Passion takes energy. Why try who wants to fail? Decisions? I don't make them. Then I'm off the hook. I'm along for the ride. I don't actually get in the game. I might have to break a sweat.

These women represent different ways we sin against God as rulers—one is aggressive and self-willed. The other is lazy and passive. Who does the better job?

Did you ever hear of Jezebel? She was a powerful ruler, the daughter of the King of Sidon who was a high priest of Baal. Jezebel became the queen of Israel because of her marriage to Ahab, the King. Let's see what we can learn from her story.

Jezebel's husband, King Ahab got mad because his neighbor Naboth refused to sell him his vineyard.

1 Kings 21:5-10

5 But Jezebel his wife came to him and said to him, "How is it that your spirit is so sullen that you are not eating food?" 6 So he said to her, "Because I spoke to Naboth the Jezreelite and said to him, 'Give me your vineyard for money; or else, if it pleases you, I will give you a vineyard in its place.' But he said, 'I will not give you my vineyard.' "7 Jezebel his wife said to him, "Do you not reign over Israel? Arise, eat bread, and let your heart be joyful; I will give you the vineyard of Naboth the Jezreelite." 8 So she wrote letters in Ahab's name and sealed them with his seal, and sent letters to the elders and to the nobles who were living with Naboth in his city. 9 Now she wrote in the letters, saying, "Proclaim a fast and seat Naboth at the head of the people; 10 and seat two worthless men before him, and let them testify against him, saying, 'You cursed God and the king.' Then take him out and stone him to death."

The leading men of Naboth's city did just as Jezebel directed them. They framed Naboth for blasphemy and treason and stoned him to death.

1 Kings 21:14-16

Responding to God

Use the PRAISE acrostic to help you pray with understanding about the Fall and the Curse.

Praise God that He has not left us alone in this cursed world.

Repent of your willfulness and passivity.

Acknowledge that you are broken and rebellious.

Intercede for family and friends who don't even know they're fallen.

Supplication—ask God to give you insight into your rebellious domain.

Equipping—ask God to remake you to rule for Him.



Visualize it this way...

Remember the lovely statue of a young woman that we imagined in Lesson 1. Now imagine that statue being thrown to the ground into a puddle of acid.

What would happen? Of course, it would break in several pieces and the pieces would be corroded by the acid. Imagine that you pick up the pieces and glue them back together as best you can. You can do this because the original shape is unmistakable. It's obvious where the arms go and where the head goes, etc.

When you get it all glued back, you can see the original shape once again, but the corrosion, cracks, and uneven edges are impossible to hide. You have the statue of a young woman who is clearly human in form, but she is a broken, corrupt image. This is a tiny picture of what it is like to be a a fallen image of God.

The big ideas are...


- 1. Adam chose to sin against God, causing our whole race to fall.

We are sinners, not only because we do bad things, but because our very natures are corrupt. When we understand this, then we will want to receive the grace of God.





LESSON OVERVIEW

The question is ...

After the alienation of sin, is there any way I can be God's daughter again?

The answer is ...

By the miracle of salvation, God makes us His daughters through adoption.

The basic text is ...

John 1:12-13

12 But as many as received Him [Christ], to them He gave the right to become children of God, even to those who believe in His name, 13 who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God.

All the "restored in Christ" lessons in this study are about salvation—what God does for us to rescue our fallen femininity and restore us to Him.

Getting Started

I once saw a three-dimensional taco on a highway billboard that made me want to give up Mexican food forever. On the other hand, a bunch of grapes in a furniture store had me fooled until I picked it up. Plastic food can be the right shape, the right color; it can even fool you for a while. But not one molecule of it is real food, because by nature it is something completely different.

In our first lesson, we talked about the fact that we are created in the image of God to rule on this earth. In the second lesson, we learned that fallen people are still in God's image—the basic outline of our being is still human. But our nature is completely different. Instead of loving God and bringing forth genuine obedience and faith, we have sin natures that hate God and produce self-righteousness and lawlessness. In this lost condition, we are no more truly God's children than plastic food is real food.

Slave or Daughter of the King?

Telling the difference between a slave and a real princess can be harder than telling the difference between real and plastic food. A princess can dress like a slave, and a slave can impersonate a princess. However, it finally comes down to this: A real princess has the blood of a king and is heir to his realm. A slave does not.

Since Adam, all of us start out as slaves. Our condition is much worse than most people realize. Read Ephesians 2:1-3 (sidebar) to see a devastating picture of what it means to be a slave to sin.

When you acknowledge your sin and accept Christ, the God of the universe, your King and Creator, becomes your Father. This adoption and new birth is a one-time event which is the foundation and beginning of your whole Christian life. Just as being physically born is a one-time event which begins all the rest of your life on earth, so being spiritually reborn is a one-time event which begins all the rest of your life forever.

Princess Power for Living

A princess is born to rule because her father is a king. Remember Jezebel in the last lesson? She was an earthly princess, the daughter of a king; and boy, did she rule! The only problem was she ruled wickedly. Nevertheless, a princess is born to rule. Her rulership is based on her relationship with her father the king.

If you are adopted by God, you are not the daughter of an earthly king, but of the perfect, heavenly King. You have power and authority based on your relationship to your heavenly Father, just as an earthly princess has power based on her relationship with her earthly father.

Amazingly, God has not only shared the benefit of Christ's death with us (our sins are paid for), and the benefit of His life (we get credit for perfect righteousness), He has also given us status in heaven with Christ. Just think! God prepared good works for you to do. He laid out "your world," "your domain," with work for you to do for Him. Does this sound like our first lesson on ruling, subduing, and being fruitful for God? It should, because Christ died to fulfill His original purpose—that we should rule for Him and with Him.

After we are saved—adopted by God to be His daughters—we still have a fallen body. Our minds still struggle against darkness, our consciences against hardness, and our hearts against rebellion. However, we have a new spirit, a regenerate spirit that loves God and calls Him Father. The goal of Christian growth is that your new spirit will flood your mind, will, attitudes, and actions such that you become like Christ, the first born Son in the family of God. 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As restored princesses we have the **authority** to rule because we are true daughters of the King—God is our Father.

We have the **capacity** to rule because our mind, will, and emotions are now indwelt by a new re-born spirit.

We have the **power** to rule because we know the amazing fulness of God's love.

Regal Future for Daughters of the King

Remember God's salvation is a big plan. First we are born into His family by faith in Jesus Christ—this is adoption. Next, we grow in power and obedience by understanding God's great love for us—this is maturing in Christ. Finally, in the next life we will be transformed, not just our spirits, but our bodies, our domains, everything—this is **glorification**.

God saves us in the same order in which we fell. Adam's spirit fell first and then later his body died. In salvation, our spirits are reborn first and then later our bodies will be made immortal. We don't know a whole lot about what it will be like to have a resurrected, immortal body, but we know some things.

Because this is true, what should I do?

There are many fairy stories about princesses—Snow White, Sleeping Beauty, Cinderella, and The Little Mermaid to name a few. The prince awakens Sleeping Beauty with a kiss; Cinderella finds her Prince at the Ball; and Snow White miraculously recovers from a poison apple. These are only stories; but, lost parents, wicked queens, poison apples, horrible curses, and miraculous princes are "more real" than you may realize. Important Term

glorification: happens after death when a believer is purged of the sin nature, given an immortal body like Christ's, rewarded for the deeds done in the flesh, thereby taking his proper place in God's eternal kingdom.

Our earthly fathers are meant to be pictures of God, the Heavenly Father. Some men are good representatives of God; others are not. You should honor your earthly father as a man, respect his office, thank him for his goodness, and forgive him for his failures.

Probably the most important part of growing from being a girl into a woman is learning to root your identity and security in your Heavenly Father instead of your earthly father. Ask God to bless you in this transition as you continue to grow into full maturity as a woman and a daughter of the King.



Visualize it this way...

The classic story, *The Little Princess* by Frances Hodgson Burnett, illustrates the importance of knowing who we are to God. Sara, the main character, is able to endure many misfortunes at the boarding house where she has to live, because of the love her father has for her. During his absence and feared death, she remains stable because she remembers she is precious to him. When the headmaster at the boarding house is cruel, dresses her in rags, and treats her like a servant, she remembers she is still her father's little princess.

We each have a heavenly Father who loves and cherishes us much more than Sara's father cherished her. As we experience various tests and trials in this life, our identity and security should be rooted in our Heavenly Father's unfailing love.

The big ideas are...

- 1. By receiving Christ, I am adopted by God as His true child.
- 2. In obeying Christ, I can become the regal and responsible ruler of my world.
- 3. In Christ's reward, my domain and I will one day be gloriously transformed.

The important words are...

salvation adoption regeneration glorification

Summing up...

True "princess power" is based on knowing the love of God our Father and King.

Who Fits the Profile?

When you have learned the biblical aspects of femininity well, you will start seeing them all over the place—in yourself, your mother, aunts, sisters, your girlfriends, in books, in movies, and in the news. Because all women were created by God to be women, they have these aspects. Of course all women are also fallen, so we see lots of perverted versions of the aspects as well.

To help you practice learning to see the aspects, we will consider women from four categories in each *Life Lesson*—from the Bible, from history, from literature, and from film.

To get you started, an example is supplied in each category. Add a character of your own in each category explaining how you see the *Daughter of the King* aspect in this woman.

"Life lessons" are provided at the completion of each aspect for review, reflection, and application. After studying each aspect as it was created, fallen, and redeemed, it is good to practice "seeing" it in the world around us. The more accurately we understand Daughter of the King in day-to-day life, the better we will live it out as redeemed women.
